

# Well-Child Visits First 30 Months of Life (W30)

## **APPLICABLE LINES OF BUSINESS**

- Commercial
- Exchange

### **MEASURE DESCRIPTION**

The percentage of patients who had the following number of well-child visits with a PCP during the last 15 months<sup>i</sup>. The following rates are reported:

- Well-child visits in the first 15 months. Children who turned 15 months old during the measurement year: six or more well-child visits.
- Well-child visits for age 15 months to 30 months. Children who turned 30 months old during the measurement year: two or more well-child visits.

#### **EXCLUSIONS**

Patients are excluded if they:

- Received hospice services or elect to use a hospice benefit any time during the measurement year.
- Died during the measurement year.

# **TIPS FOR SUCCESS**

#### Patient Care

- Reinforce to parents or guardians that well-child visits are an opportunity for a doctor to evaluate the child's overall growth, health, and determine whether any developmental or social issues require further examination.
- Take advantage of every office visit (including problem-focused visits) to provide a well-child exam and submit the appropriate corresponding exam codes.
- Coach staff to schedule visits within timeframe guidelines after each visit before the patient leaves the office.
- Telehealth visits are acceptable to meet the measure requirements.
- Consider parents' work schedule as a barrier to visits and offer extended evening or weekend hours.

### **Documentation and Coding**

- This measure is based on medical claims, which is why it is so important to ensure that the most appropriate primary diagnosis code is assigned for the well-child exam.
- Code for exclusions.
- Partner with your health plan payers to submit electronic data from your EMR.
- Document medical and surgical history in the medical record with dates in structured fields so your EMR can include these in reporting. This will allow the corresponding code to be included in electronic reporting, including claims, to health plans.
- Use standardized documentation formats to capture the elements of a well-child visit and to assist with coding/ billing procedures.
